This book presents a n updated summary of the social science



The final chapter provides a new vision for the emergency management profession-one that reflects a more strategic approach wherein disasters are viewed as non-routine social problems.

Jacobsen, Michael H. (2019). Emotions, everyday life and sociology. New York: Routledge.

Congdon, Peter. (2020). Bavesian hierarchical models: with applications using R. Boca Raton: CRC Press.

An intermediate-level treatment of Bayesian hierarchical models and their applications,

this book demonstrates the advantages of a Bayesian approach to data sets involving inferences for collections of related units or variables, and in methods where parameters can be treated as random collections. Through illustrative data analysis and attention to statistical computing, this book facilitates practical implementation of Bayesian hierarchical methods.

This edition maintains a focus on applied modelling and data analysis, but now using entirely R-based Bayesian computing options.

Sahin, Ismail. (2020). Educational Practices during the COVID-19 Viral Outbreak: International Perspectives. Monument: ISTES Organization (Ubicado en base de datos ERIC).

This book examines educational practices during the COVID-19 viral outbreak. Disruptions to the normal processes and practices of education associated with the novel coronavirus are directly tied, among other considerations, to the societal risk of having students congregating in close quarters, the economic problems encountered by their families, difficulties of food availability, and loss of family cohesion due to death, illness, and lack of proximity and diminished support structures due to social distancing.

This twelve chapters brings together a variety of studies and scholars effort to exemplify how the COVID-19 shapes the learning and teaching processes in different countries.


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


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

Allan, Jonathan. (2020). Men, masculinities and popular romance. New York: Routledge.

Popular romance novels, perhaps more than any other

genre, explore sexuality and gender, creating an ideal space in which to consider and explore theoretical models that think seriously about gender. How can these novels maintain, according to some, feminist ideals, while also upholding what Raewyn Connell has long theorized as "hegemonic masculinity"? This collection of nine papers brings together



Ellis, Darren. (2021). Emotions in the digital age. Technologies, data and psychosocial life. New York: Routledge.


This book examines how emotion is understood, researched and experienced in relation to practices of digitisation and datafication said to constitute a digital age. The overarching concern is with how emotion operates in, through, and with digital technologies. The digital landscape is vast, and as such, the authors focus on four key areas of digital practice: artificial intelligence, social media, mental health, and surveillance. Interrogating each area shows how emotion is commodified, symbolised, shared and experienced, and as such operates in multiple dimensions. This constitutes a psycho-social way of being in which digital technologies and emotion operate as key dimensions of the ways we simultaneously relate to ourselves as individual subjects and to others as part of collectives.

Gottzén, Lucas. (2020). Routledge International Handbook of Masculinity Studies. New York: Routledge.

The Routledge International Handbook of Masculinity Studies provides a contemporary critical and scholarly overview of theorizing and research on masculinities as well as emerging ideas and areas of study that are likely to shape research and understanding of gender and men in the future.

The forty-eight chapters of the handbook take an interdisciplinary approach to a range of topics on men and masculinities related to identity, sex, sexuality, culture, aesthetics, technology and pressing social issues. The handbook's transnational lens acknowledges both the localities and global character of masculinity. A clear message in the book is the need for intersectional theorizing in dialogue with feminist, queer and sexuality studies in making sense of men and masculinities.

Gray, Anne. (2014). An introduction to the therapeutic frame. New York: Routledge.

Designed for psychotherapists and counsellors in training, An Introduction to the Therapeutic Frame clarifies the concept of the frame - the way of working set out in the first meeting between therapist and client.

Anne Gray, an experienced psychotherapist and teacher, uses lively and extensive case material to show how the frame can both contain feelings and further understanding within the therapeutic relationship. She takes the reader through each stage of therapeutic work, from the first meeting to the final contact, and looks at those aspects of management that beginners often find difficult, such as fee payment, letters and telephone calls, supervision and evaluation.

Leiter, Michael. (2014). Burnout at work: A psychological perspective. London: Psychology Press.

The psychological concept of burnout refers to long-term exhaustion from, and diminished interest in, the work we do. Many people start their working lives full of energy and enthusiasm, but far fewer are able to maintain that level of engagement.

This work provides a comprehensive overview of how the concept of burnout has been conceived over recent decades, as well as discussing the challenges and possible interventions that can help confront this pervasive issue. Including contributions from the most eminent researchers in this field, the book examines a range of topics including: The links between burnout and health; How our individual relationships at work can affect levels of burnout; The role of leadership in mediating or causing burnout; The strategies that individuals can pursue to avoid burnout, as well as wider interventions.

Prolonged Grief Related to COVID-19 Deaths: Do We Have to Fear a Steep Rise in Traumatic and **Disenfranchised Griefs?**

Abstract: The circumstances of coronavirus disease (COVID-19)-related deaths embed multiple traumatic characteristics, alongside several external factors that can disenfranchise individual grief. In this context, severe forms of traumatic distress, guilt, somatization, regret, anger, and unspecific symptoms not yet included in prolonged grief disorder (PGD) criteria could emerge. This article (a) analyzes factors related to bereavement in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic; (b) proposes avenues for meaning-making practices to facilitate individual and collective mourning process; and (c) invites clinicians to pay attention to the traumatic characteristics of COVID-19-related deaths adopting a holistic approach of PGD clinical manifestations, as well as in evaluation and treatment of cases.

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

Rooksby, Emma. (2017). Habitus: a sense of place. New York: Routledge.

Habitus is a concept developed by the late French sociologist, Pierre Bourdieu, as a 'sense of one's place...a sense of the other's place'. It relates to our perceptions of the positions (or 'place') of ourselves and other people in the world in which we live and how these perceptions affect our actions and interactions with places and people. Habitus implies that a web of complex processes links the physical, the social and the mental. Inspired by this concept, this compelling book brings together leading scholars from interdisciplinary fields to examine ways in which spaces and places are constructed, interpreted and used by different people. This edition contains updated chapter material, together with an entirely new introduction and revised conclusions which recognise the importance of Bourdieu's work.

Daniels, Harry. (2016). Vygotsky and Pedagogy. New York: Routledge.

This book explores the growing interest in Vygotsky and the pedagogic implications of the body of work that is developing under the influence of his theories. It provides an overview of the ways in which the original writing has been extended and identifies areas for future development.

The author considers how these developments are creating new and important possibilities for the practices of teaching and learning in school and beyond, and illustrates how Vygotskian theory can be applied in the classroom.

Longo, Mariano. (2019). Emotions through literature : fictional narratives and the management of the self. New York: Routledge.

Engaging with the wide sociological literature on emotions, this book explores the social representation of emotions, their management and their effects by making reference to creative sources. With a specific focus on literary narrative, including the works of figures such as Dante, Austen, Manzoni, Tolstoy and Kundera, the author draws out the capacity of literary works to describe and represent both the external aspects of social relations and the inner motivations of the involved actors. An interdisciplinary study that combines sociology, narratology, philosophy, historical analysis and literary criticism, *Emotions through Literature* invites us to re-think the role of emotions in sociological analysis, employing literary narratives to give plausible intellectual responses to the double nature of emotions, their being both individual and social.
